Voters could decide cityhood for Wildomar in November

WILDOMAR – Voters could decide in November whether the unincorporated community of Wildomar should become its own city, it was reported Sunday.

If the Local Agency Formation Commission, which oversees incorporation efforts, and the county Board of Supervisors approve an incorporation application by mid-July, voters would likely be asked in November to consider the merits of cityhood, *The Californian* reported.

The application was submitted by Wildomar Incorporation Now. If the application is not approved, the group would have to issue a new application to the commission and start anew.

Wildomar, between Murrieta and Lake Elsinore, has about 30,000 residents.

Proponents of the cityhood bid told residents Saturday that a recent study shows the community is able to offer the same level of services provided by the county, which has directly governed Wildomar, the newspaper reported.

The study, completed by Orange County consultant Gary Thompson, will be released to the public in March, cityhood proponent Sheryl Ade told the newspaper.

The 12-member, pro-incorporation advocacy group Wildomar Incorporation Now organized the meeting at Wildomar Elementary School, which attracted about 75 people, the newspaper reported.

Proponents at the meeting said it's difficult to hold county officials accountable for what happens in their community.
