

I have a proven record as a taxpayer advocate, having actively fought tax increases in Wildomar. I spearheaded opposition to Measure "G" on the June 2006 ballot, the largest bond proposal in Riverside County history and the largest bond measure in California that election cycle.

I'm currently litigating against the assessment for Wildomar parks. Proponents promised a new park east of the 15 Freeway upon approval of the new tax; but land needed for the park had not been secured prior to the election. Now it's apparent "Wildomar Park East" won't be constructed for years, if ever.

The same characters promising a park east of the freeway now promise you Super Wal-Mart east of the freeway if you vote for city-hood. But as before, the promise is based on little more than a promoter's speculation; no approvals obtained, no permits issued, and no assurances from Wal-Mart. Because the feasibility of Wildomar incorporation teeters on the assumption of \$500,000.00 annually from Wal-Mart, project delays could result in millions of dollars of red ink and corresponding tax increases to cover the shortfall.
